WHAT'S HAPPENING AT CAMP?

Well, to sum it up, a lot! For one thing, camp registration finally went electronic this year! Parents have been asking for it for a while now and seem to be happy with the change. For more on that, be sure to read Nancy Levine Blumenfeld's article "Loving the New Online Registration" on page 3.

As far as construction projects go, I think most of you know that Lake Wendy's dam had to be completely bulldozed and rebuilt. That project, costing around one million dollars, is on track for opening the lake back up in time for 1st session this summer. In addition, we've completely rebuilt two bath houses (bigger, better and warmer!). We were able to build an awesome addition to "Sababa" (our Israeli culture space) at the Benator Cultural Center, thanks to the Horesh family from Atlanta (see article on page 2 about the Two Families). It includes a "Sifria" Library, media center, "Western Wall" and adjacent koi pond! We have also added new adult lodging for more Artists-in-Residence and a very special place called "Sam's Deck", thanks to the friends and family of Sam Lapidus (see article on page 2 about the Two Families), which will be near the Zaban Chapel and overlook Lake

Wendy. There is also a new "Food Network-like" Camper Kitchen, new rope courses, jet skis, mountain bikes, and scooters, and another new beach adventure near the Blob, Iceberg, Log Roll, "Hurricane" water slide and "Rave" water trampoline!

We are all aware of the economy's effects on how we each determine where our money is spent. At Camp Barney, we are cognizant of the fact that parents choose to send their children to camp and look for the value just as they would in any other purchase in pursuit of "wants and needs". As in years past, we've searched for resources for families seeking financial assistance in any and all possible ways. We are hopefully doing something right because we are defying the trend for all overnight camps in North America (based on recent surveys from the American Camp Association and the Foundation for Jewish Camp). We are currently at 100% of capacity for this summer. Barney's aim is still to provide the "most meaningful and exciting Jewish overnight camping experience"!

TWO FAMILIES CREATE A LEGACY AT CAMP FOR 2009 AND BEYOND

Billy and Susan Lapidus and their children from Birmingham, Alabama have been part of Camp Barney for many years. Billy is our 4th-week Doctor-in-Residence, Susan works in our Camp Office during our First Session, and Sam, Noah, and Clara have literally grown up at Camp Barney each summer.

On November 5th, after a long and extraordinarily courageous battle with cancer, **Sam Lapidus** passed away at age 14. His family, friends and Camp Barney "community" were among the more than one thousand people from throughout the Southeast who expressed their grief and celebrated Sam's life during his memorial service in Birmingham. Billy and Susan Lapidus and Camp Barney have chosen to create a special place at Camp Barney Medintz this summer to celebrate the life of Sam Lapidus.

Thanks to the wonderful gestures and generous contributions from so many kids and families (including the sales of a cool bracelet created by his friends), we are building "**Sam's Deck**" which will be perched on a hill near the Zaban Chapel overlooking Lake Wendy and Horserange Mountain. Campers will be invited to plant trees nearby at the beginning of each session as a living tribute to this remarkable young man.

Michelle and Joseph Horesh of Atlanta have sent their daughters, Stacy and Maya to Camp Barney for several years. Very sadly, Joseph passed away in May of 2008. Because of their family's genuine passion for Camp Barney, The **Horesh Family** has chosen to build an extraordinary space adjacent to "Sababa" (our Israeli Culture place) that is part of the Benator Cultural Center.

The Horesh center will include a "Sifria" Library and Media Center, Israeli and other cultural activities, have a massive replica of the "Western Wall" and "Gates" similar to the old city in Jerusalem. We created an adjacent koi pond cascading down the middle of the Benator Center.

We are so grateful to the Horesh Family for their very thoughtful gift which will be quite special for campers and, of course, honor the life of Joseph Horesh.

Camp Barney Medintz was established in 1963 - that means, of course, we're beginning our 47th summer of meaningful and exhilarating experiences. Over 38,000 campers, staff, families and supporters comprise our Camp Barney Medintz alumni!

Camp Barney was just chosen as one of only a handful of Jewish overnight camps to receive a generous grant from the prestigious. Massachusettsbased Grinspoon Foundation to help us identify and reach out to alumni, receive and provide updates. establish an Alumni Association. and provide a match of gifts of at least \$25,000. Thanks to this grant, we are beefing up our alumni efforts. Our first Alumni Day last year was very successful and we plan to make it an annual event. We are now focusing on other potential alumni activities.

REMEMBER WHEN...

As a nine year-old, I was fortunate enough to be a charter camper at CBM in 1963. Driving through the beautiful Blue Ridge Mountains in a Greyhound Bus was the beginning of an innocent yet exciting time away from school, parents and chores. Of course there were no cell phones, no digital cameras. and no laptops. It truly was an age of learning about myself and others. There was no contact with my comfort zone. What is easy to remember is the almost primitive feel of the buildings in the woods that made up the Camp. My first year at CBM, I was assigned to Village 1. My cabin seemed like a large room with maybe eight bunk beds. The counselor quarters were in the center of the cabin as I recall. My counselor was Arnie (I think that was his name). Arnie became the surrogate parent who was "cool". We had so much fun at archery, riflery, canoeing, arts and crafts (I made my Dad an ashtray), and of course the ski-doodler. Since I was a camper at CBM again in 1964 and 1965, the memories tend to blend with one another.

How can I forget the outdoor camping trips that we took? One of the favorite

stories that I like to tell to this day is the time we took one of these outdoor camping trips; we were to dig our own latrines. There was no toilet paper and one of my fellow campers accidentally used poison ivy. Oops! It was on one of these camping trips that I became a charter member of the One-Match Club. To have your name on the wall in the dining room was one of the hottest things that you could do during camping season. Another memory includes hikes through the woods where wonderful stories were told about real or imaginary civil war battles that took place. Or about the "Roadrunner" (similar to the cartoon variety) that had just passed by. I was re-introduced to Israeli dancing at CBM. Dancing with girls!!!!!!! I loved it!!! Truthfully, my regret is not having kept a journal. But can vou expect an excited nine-year old to be thinking of that? I will simply have to rely on my fifty-five year old brain to supply me with those wonderful memories. If any of you charter campers are out there and reading this please contact me to reminisce.
