In the early 1980s, three facilities were built that changed camp in a major way. The first one was the Shirley Halpern Arts & Crafts Center, which, at the time, was quite an expansion. If not for this wonderful new addition, how would it have ever been possible for Ross Shapiro to sleep in the rafters?

We also thank the Halpern family for the building of the multi-purpose Bernard Halpern Activity Center. It's really hard for those attending Camp today to think about what it was like without the BHAC. That's right! Basketball was played on the tennis court closest to the road! The BHAC also gave Camp a new venue for Shabbat Concert... "Stop playing with the rocks!"

The 80s also saw the creation of the Teen Village just behind the chapel. The new village really spread Camp out more than ever before, and it was a pretty cool place to live in those early years. Remember all the new wood chips that lined the paths?

The bathrooms actually had hot water, and there was even a mirror above the sinks!

There were some interesting characters that worked at Camp in those days, too. Do you remember our Judaic specialist Dov Kentoff? He and his wife decided to have a little swim at Dobbs Creek on a day off and were surprised by a group of our campers on a day hike. It wouldn't have been such a surprise if our camp rabbi and his wife had their swim suits on at the time (I'm sure it was a big hit on letter writing day). Do you remember Kip Cohen from Pittsburgh? This guy dressed up in a garbage bag and transformed himself into a big Fig Newton for Shabbat Concert. An act that will never be forgotten! Do you remember when Stevie Slotin and Gary Lind took lounge chairs down to the Poo Pond and laid out in the sun while the rest of camp was walking to the chapel for services? Lastly, and one of my favorites, when I was JIT Unithead in 1985, Greg Reish and Brad Cohen decided that for their day off they wanted to do their laundry.....in Arkansas!!! Well, they actually made it to Arkansas and back, and weren't late returning from their day off either. Unfortunately, they didn't get their laundry done. That was a long road trip with smelly bog clothes.

It's hard to believe that 27 years have passed since 1980, but to help you remember, the next time you're deciding what to have for lunch, why not have a pitcher of red bug juice to go along with your barbecued bologna??!! By-the-way, Brian Goldman still holds the record at 63 pieces!
